## Blast form the Past!

Its snowing outside and it's difficult to believe we will be flying soon. (Even though we will be standing 6 feet apart.) Combat planes can get closer!!

It's time to cycle your batteries. They have been sitting for a couple of months. I have numbered each battery and keep a spreadsheet of the discharge times. When the battery capacity decreases to 80-90 % of the battery milliamp/hour rating, it's time to replace it.

Also, perform maintenance on your planes and drones. Look for loose screws and nuts. Inspect clevises and control horns. Pull on control surfaces to verify mounting integrity. Fix at home - fly at the field. Last spring, I believe I shared a plane inspection list in a newsletter. Check it out. I can resend it if needed.

Now is the time to finish those winter projects you've been working on. You might also think about cleaning your workshop.

Ken Slaght (586-5900) is retiring from the hobby. He has 2 radios and about 10 electric planes; from beginner planes to a jet. Once I can get pictures and descriptions, I'll post them on our for-sale website. He's in Hill Crest retirement home which right now is closed to visitors.

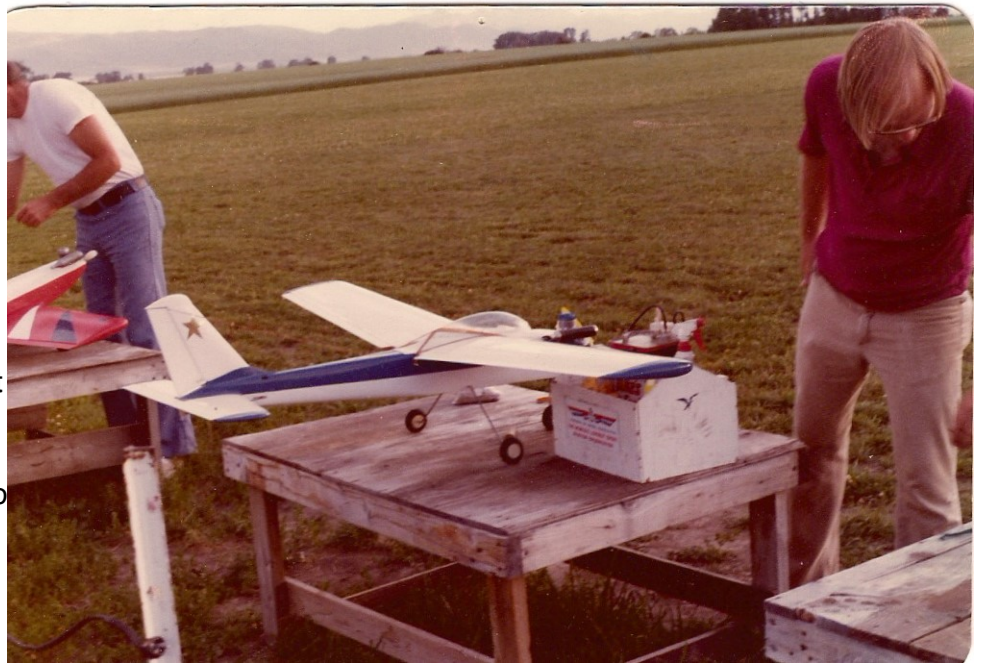

## Collings Foundation

As many of you know, the Collings Foundation is the organization that brings WWII vintage aircraft around the country every year for the public to see both as static displays and, for actual flights one can purchase and get a feel for what it was like inside these noisy beasts! Unlike piston engined airliners from the '30s - '60s, they have no insulation, either sound or temperature. I was able to take a 30 minute ride on their B-25 in July of 2018 and without good ear protection, which they provided for us, it would've been an unbearable flight!

Unfortunately, they lost their B-17G (and seven lives) during such a flight in Connecticut last October due to engine problems shortly after takeoff and a subsequent crash landing at Bradley International Airport, near Hartford.

An article last week in the Hartford Courant by David Owens states:

*The FAA, according to a decision released Wednesday, found that the Stow, Massachusetts-based Collings Foundation failed to properly maintain two of the four engines on the aircraft that crashed, did not follow the requirements of its permission to operate the aircraft with paying passengers and “lacked a safety culture when operating the B17-G.”*

*The FAA decision revoked the permission it had previously granted Collings to carry paying passengers and rejected an application to the FAA to renew that permission to carry paying passengers.*

*The National Transportation Safety Board, which works closely with the FAA, is likely months away from issuing its report on the Oct. 2 crash of the B17-G “Nine O Nine,” which developed engine trouble after takeoff and crashed while trying to return to the airport. Not being able to collect the fees passengers pay to fly aboard the foundation’s World War II bombers, about \$450 a ride, could effectively ground the organization’s “Wings of Freedom” tour, which has traveled the nation for about 30 years. The Collings Foundation has brought its aircraft to Connecticut dozens of times during that 30-year period.*

Obviously, this is a huge setback for the foundation. Hopefully, they'll be successful working with the FAA to get their 'Living History Flying Exemption' reinstated in the near future. I've always enjoyed seeing these airplanes (typically a B-17, B-25, B-24, and P-51) when they've been at Gallatin field on an annual basis.
